Latin American and Latino history dates back to indigenous peoples. Long before Europeans arrived in the region, the Aztec, Maya and Inca civilizations flourished in Central and South America.

The U.S. Hispanic or Latino population grew to 62.1 million in 2020. Census Bureau data estimates Hispanics will become the largest population group in Texas this year.
